## **METHODOLOGY**

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This book contains the results of a survey of likely voters in Gallatin County, Montana. It was conducted by Moore Information, Incorporated, an independent, public opinion research company located in Portland, Oregon.

### ***Sample***

A total of 500 interviews were conducted. Random digit dialing of telephone households county-wide and sampling within those households were used to ensure a representative sample of voters was interviewed. Potential respondents were screened to include only those registered voters who are likely to vote in the November 2000 election.

### ***Data Collection***

The interviews were conducted April 28-29, 2000 by Moore Information personnel working from the company's phone bank in Portland, Oregon. Ten percent of each interviewer's work was monitored while in process and verified by Moore Information supervisory personnel.

### ***Sampling Error***

Readers of this book should be aware that surveys are designed to measure public opinion at a specific point in time, within defined statistical limits. This survey should not be used as a prediction of future public opinion or action.

Every sample is subject to ranges of variability, usually called sampling error. Sampling error refers to the difference between results obtained and the results that would have been obtained if every eligible voter in the county had been interviewed. The sampling error associated with this survey is +/- 4% at the 95% confidence level. Sampling error is computed at the 95% confidence level. This means if the survey were repeated 100 times, in 95 of those cases the question response would not vary more than the sampling error. For purposes of determining statistical significance between two responses, the percentage difference must be greater than the sum of the sampling error from both responses.

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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### *Overview*

Gallatin County residents are concerned about protecting open space and the natural environment of the county. Drinking water, water quality and rivers and streams are considered most essential for protection. Further, there is widespread support for voluntary agricultural preservation zoning and county-wide zoning regulations.

The public's concern about open space protection is evidenced by its support for a \$10 million bond for preservation of open space. This proposal is favored 68-20%. However, the cost impact of such a bond on the average farm or ranch owner (\$500 a year) is a significant deterrent, as a majority oppose the bond after hearing this (60-22%). By comparison, an alternative source of funding, assessing an annual fee of \$25 per household, is favored, 63-29%.

### ***Initial Ballot: Open Space Bond Measure***

Gallatin County voters widely favor a \$10 million bond measure to preserve open space in the county. After hearing the following statement, 68% of voters say they would vote "yes" to pass a \$10 million bond measure, while 20% would vote "no." The remaining 12% were undecided.

*"Shall the Gallatin County Commission be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in the sum of ten million dollars, maturing in twenty years or less, to be used to preserve open space in the County by purchasing land and conservation easements from willing landowners, for the following purposes: managing growth, preserving ranches and farms, protecting wildlife areas and water quality in streams and rivers, and providing parks and recreation areas; with all expenditures based on*

*recommendations of a citizen advisory board and subject to an annual independent audit?”*

Importantly, a majority of voters in all subgroups throughout the county support the bond measure after hearing the proposed title. However, among the most supportive are women age 18-44, Democrats, county residents of less than five years, and renters. At the same time, people who own or operate ranches in Gallatin County are less likely to support an open space bond measure than are non-ranchers, while residents of Bozeman (both inside and outside the city limits) are more likely to support the bond measure than residents elsewhere in the county.

Support for the measure is driven by voters who want to preserve land and impede growth. When supporters were asked why they support the measure, “maintain open space” was the leading reason (for 30%), followed by desires to “stop development” (14%), “stop rapid growth” (13%) and “save farms and ranches” (13%). Other supporters want to “maintain quality of life” (7%), “maintain water quality” (5%), “preserve wildlife” (4%) or believe “it’s needed” (3%).

At the same time, opposition to the measure comes from voters who “oppose a tax increase” (24%) or “oppose government intervention” (24%). Other voters oppose the measure because it “infringes on property rights” (13%), they “oppose citizen advisory board” (9%) or don’t think it is necessary (5%).

Importantly, when it comes to the dollar amount of the bond measure, decreasing the amount of the bond does not increase support for the measure. In fact, support for the proposed open space bond measure suffers when the amount of the bond drops from \$10 million to \$5 million. Indeed, a \$5 million bond measure is favored 59-19%, while a \$10 million bond measure is favored 68-20%.

***Voting Intentions: Payment Options for the Open Space Bond***

***Property Tax Levy:*** Taxpayers are just as likely to support a \$28 annual increase in their property taxes as they are a \$14 increase. For example, paying for the open space measure with an average annual increase in property taxes of \$28 per year per \$100,000 of property generates support from 64%, and opposition from 30%, while a measure funded by an average annual property tax increase of \$14 is favored by a 63-28% margin.

At the same time, voters oppose funding the measure with a property tax increase after hearing how much local farmers and ranchers would have to pay. An open space measure that would cost the average local farming or ranching business \$500-\$800 a year in additional property taxes over the 20-year life of the bond, is opposed by a 60-22% margin, while a measure that would cost the average farming or ranching business an extra \$200-\$400 a year is opposed by a 51-30% margin.

***Household Fee:*** State legislation allowing counties to fund an open space measure through a per household fee, rather than a property tax levy, partially reducing the burden on farmers and ranchers, is favored by a slim plurality (49-32%).

More specifically, a household fee of \$25 is supported by a 63-29% margin. However, when the fee is increased to \$50 annually, support declines (45% yes/41% no).

Importantly, voters are just as likely to favor a \$25 annual household fee (63-29%) as they are a property tax levy that would cost homeowners an average of \$14 (63-28%) or \$28 (64-30%) per \$100,000 of home value.

### *Methods to Protect Open Space*

When it comes to what open space and agricultural land protection methods are favored, zoning is most popular. Indeed, 70% of voters favor “voluntary agricultural preservation of zoning,” and 64% favor “county-wide zoning regulations.” Voluntary agricultural preservation zoning is favored by a majority of voters in all subgroups throughout the county. However,

- Residents of the Manhattan/Three Forks area are less supportive of voluntary agricultural preservation zoning than are residents elsewhere in the county (52% favor versus 73%).
- Voters age 18-64 are more supportive of the idea than are seniors (74% versus 53%).
- Voters with at least some college education are more supportive of it than voters with high school or less education (75% versus 54%).
- There is no difference in attitude about voluntary agricultural preservation zoning among ranch owners and non-ranch owners in the county. Among each, it is supported by more than six in ten voters.

Looking at subgroups, “county-wide zoning” is likewise favored by a majority of voters in all subgroups throughout the county. However,

- Residents inside Bozeman zip codes are more supportive of county-wide zoning than are residents in rural parts of the county (71% favor versus 49%).
- Residents with at least some college education are more supportive of county-wide zoning than are voters with a high school or less education (70% favor versus 44%).
- Democrats are more supportive of county-wide zoning than Independents and Republicans (76% favor versus 64% and 55% respectively).
- There is no difference in attitude about county-wide zoning among ranch owners and non-ranch owners in the county. Among each, it is supported by more than six in ten voters.

At the same time, three other methods did not generate support from even half of voters:

- “Local government purchase of private lands” (49% favor/37% oppose);
- “Local government purchase of scenic easements on private property” (49% favor/36% oppose); and
- “Local government purchase of development rights, leaving the property in private ownership” (44% favor/33% oppose).

### ***Prioritizing Uses for Open Space Protection Funding***

A majority of Gallatin County voters rated each of the possible programs tested in the survey as important to be funded by an open space measure. However, programs designed to protect water generated the most *intense* reactions and were most likely to be rated “extremely” important:

- “Protecting drinking water” (83% extremely important);
- “Protecting water quality in rivers and streams” (78% extremely important);
- “Protection of the Madison, Jefferson and Gallatin Rivers” (74% extremely important);

In addition, a majority of voters said seven other programs were extremely important, including:

- “Protecting wildlife habitat” (67% extremely important);
- “Protecting fish habitat in rivers and streams” (62% extremely important);
- “Protecting wildlife areas” (60% extremely important);
- “Preserving ranches and farmland” (59% extremely important);
- “Protecting the farming and ranching economy of Gallatin County” (57% extremely important);
- “Managing growth and development” (56% extremely important); and
- “Protecting the area’s rural lifestyle” (51% extremely important).

There are important semantic differences that appear to impact support for various open space programs. Notably, “protecting *water quality* in rivers and streams” is rated more important by voters than “protecting *fish habitat* in rivers and streams,” and “managing growth and development” is rated more important than “limiting sprawl.” Voters’ reactions are more intense about “protecting wildlife *habitat*” than “wildlife *areas*.” Two other split-sample style questions revealed that voters don’t distinguish between “protecting the farming and ranching economy of Gallatin County” and “preserving ranches and farmland,” or “purchasing open space land” and “purchasing open space conservation easements.”

### ***Awareness and Perceptions of Open Lands Board***

Approximately half of Gallatin County voters have heard of the Open Lands Board (52%). However, just a quarter of voters are familiar enough with the organization to

have an opinion about it (16% favorable/9% unfavorable). Importantly, voters who have a favorable opinion of the Board are more likely than those with an unfavorable opinion or no opinion about the Board to support a bond measure to protect open space in the county.

### ***Perceptions of Local Government Program Funding Needs***

More than two in three voters believe that each of the four government programs tested in the survey are in need of additional funding. However, when looking at the intensity of voters' reactions, we find that education and public schools are clearly perceived as having the greatest need for additional funding (51% believe they are in "great" need of funds), followed by protection of open space and agricultural lands (39%), roads (35%) and public safety (25%).

### ***Proponent Messages***

Six of the seven proponent messages tested in the survey generated support for an open lands ballot measure among more than six in ten voters.

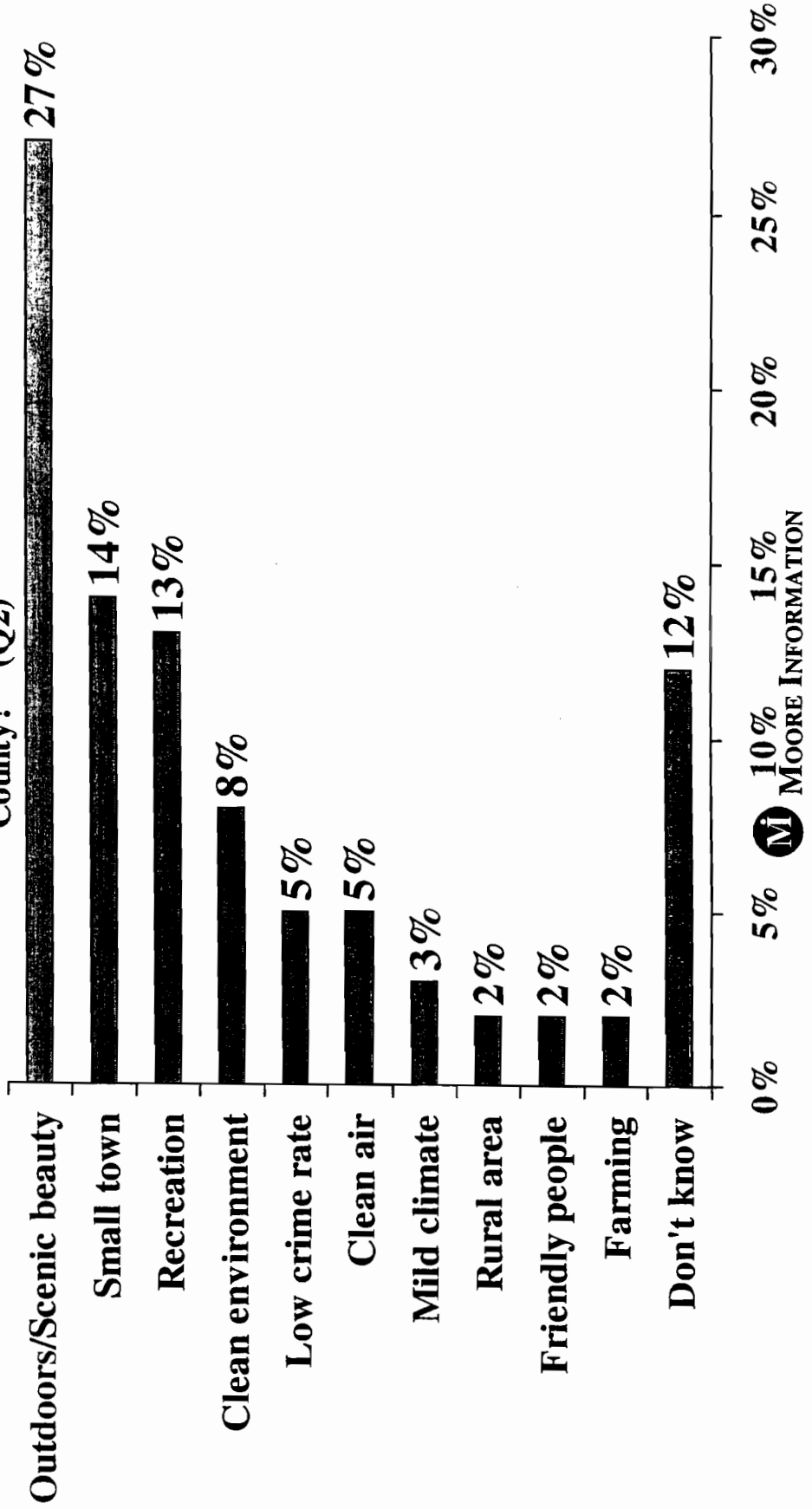
- "At the current rate of growth, the population of Gallatin County will double in twenty years – we must act now to preserve rural lands before they are lost to development" (77% more likely to vote for measure after hearing this/15% less likely);
- "The preservation of Gallatin County's rural lifestyle and agricultural economy is dependent on preserving farm and open space lands" (76% more likely/15% less likely);
- "All funds raised locally for open space will be matched by state and private funding" (76% more likely/14% less likely);
- "The preservation of Gallatin County's rural lifestyle and agricultural economy is dependent on planned development" (71% more likely/18% less likely);

- “An independent citizens' board will decide how to spend the money, and a public audit will be conducted to make sure the money is spent as promised” (69% more likely/22% less likely); and
- “The local government will purchase development rights from landowners who voluntarily restrict development on their property through conservation easements, leaving land in private hands and on county tax rolls” (63% more likely/24% less likely).

At the same time, the argument that “a bond or property tax measure is the only legally available option capable of generating significant funds for open space” was not as well received (45% were more likely and 34% less likely to support an open lands ballot measure after hearing this).

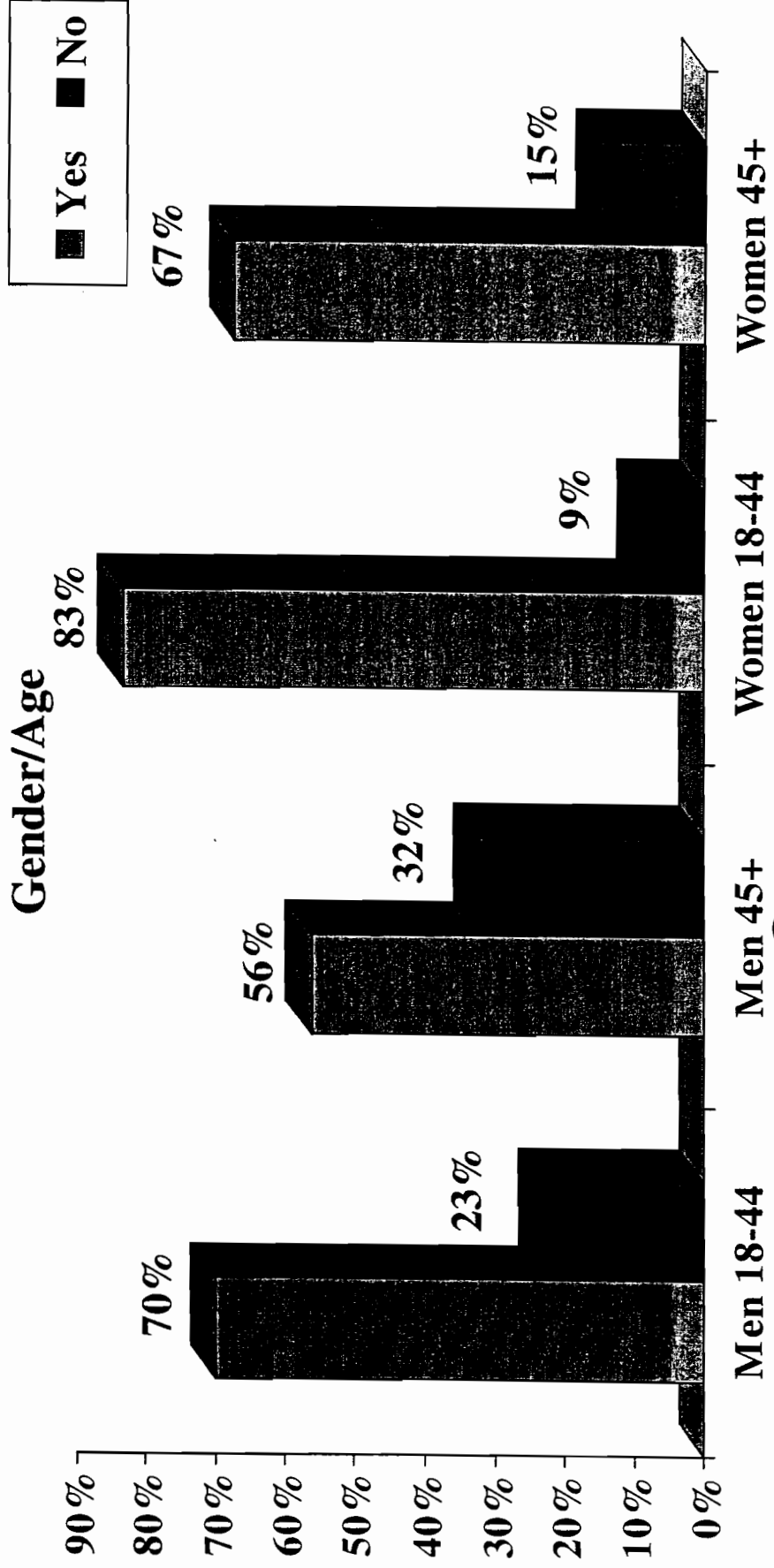


# Initial Ballot: Ranch Owners/Operators Are Among The Least Supportive

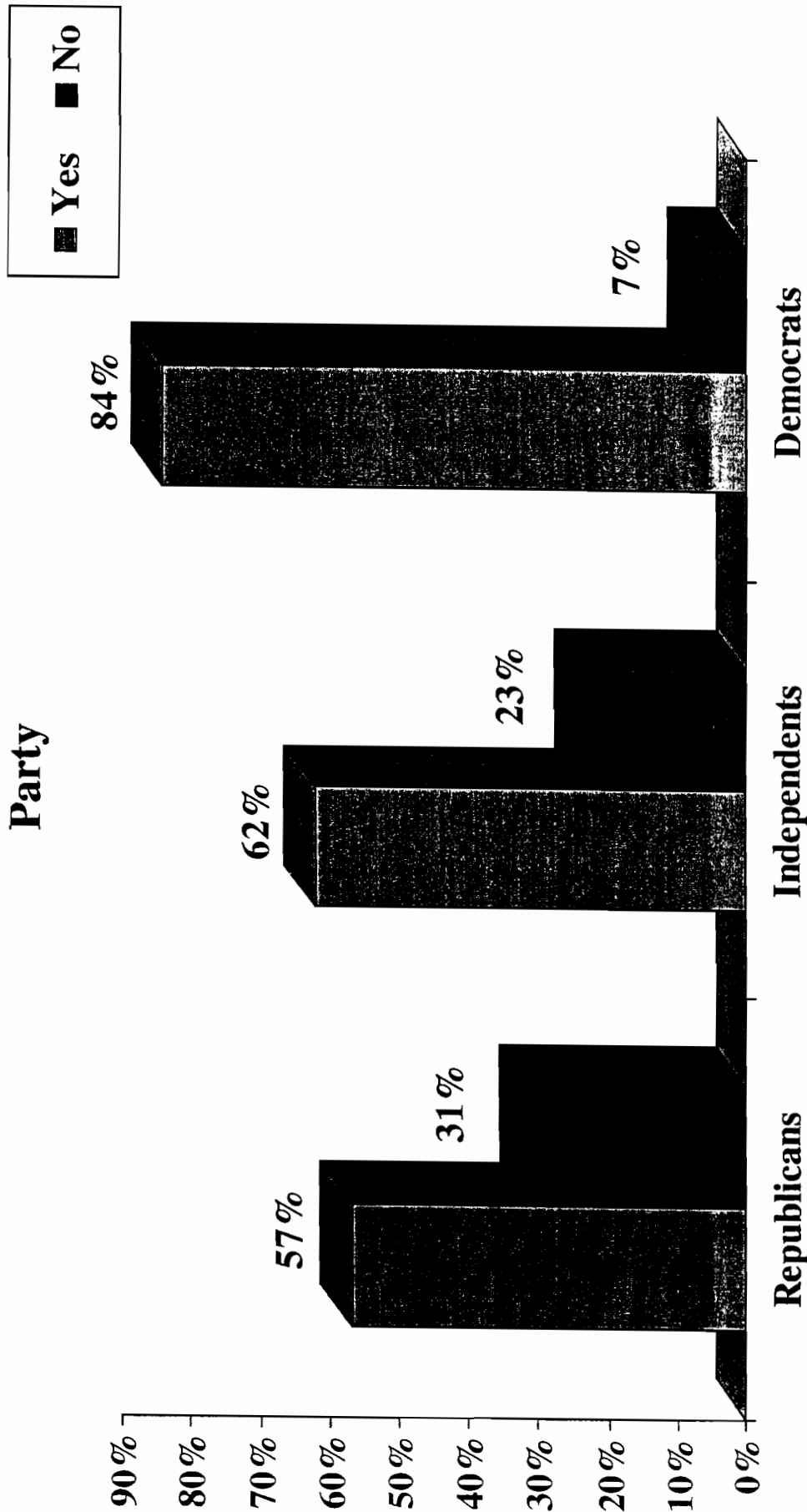

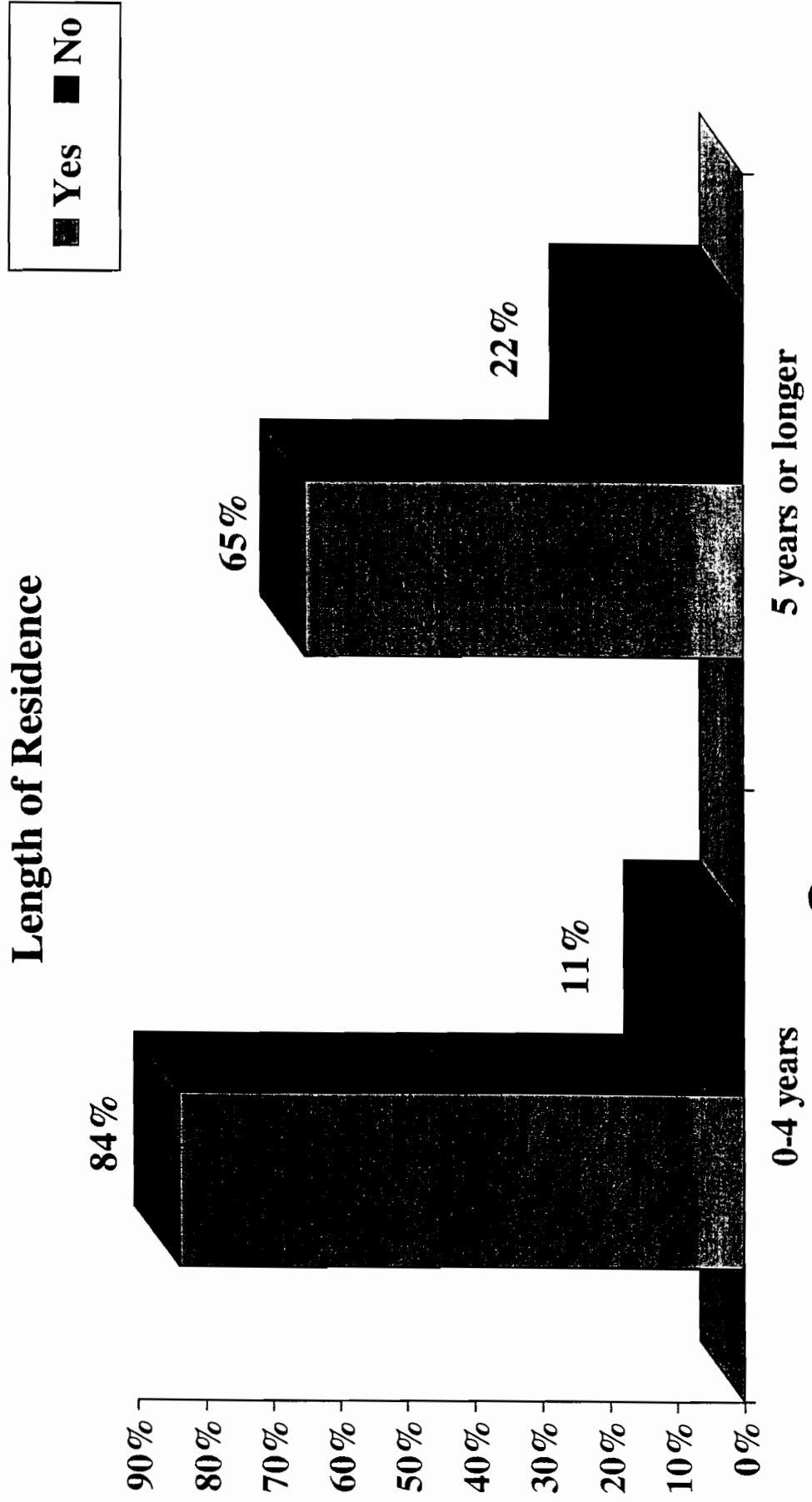
# Initial Ballot: Women Are More Supportive Of Measure Than Men, & Voters 18-44 Are More Supportive Than Older Voters



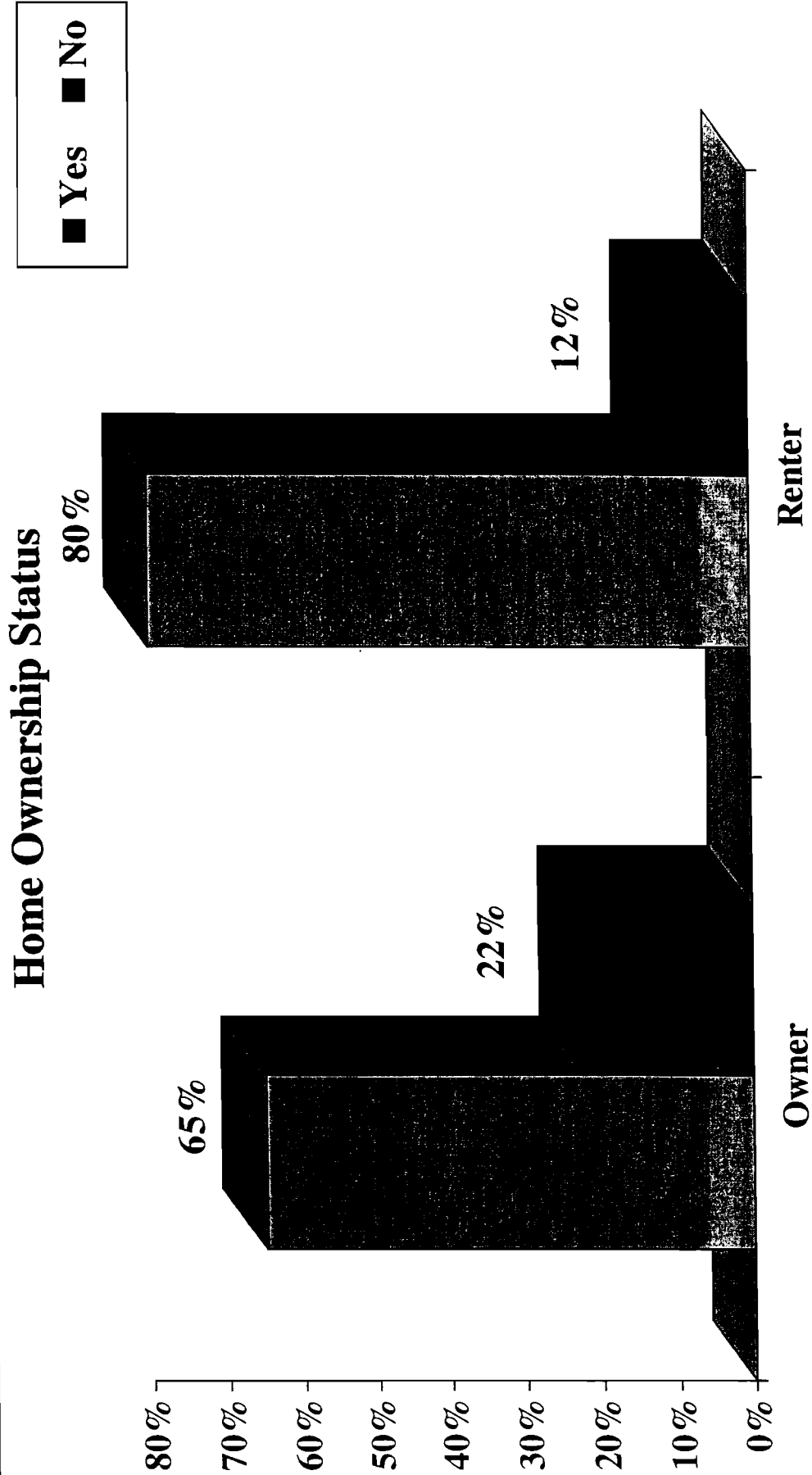
# Initial Ballot: Democrats Are More Supportive Of Measure Than Independents & Republicans



# Initial Ballot: Newer Residents Are More Supportive Than Long-Time Residents

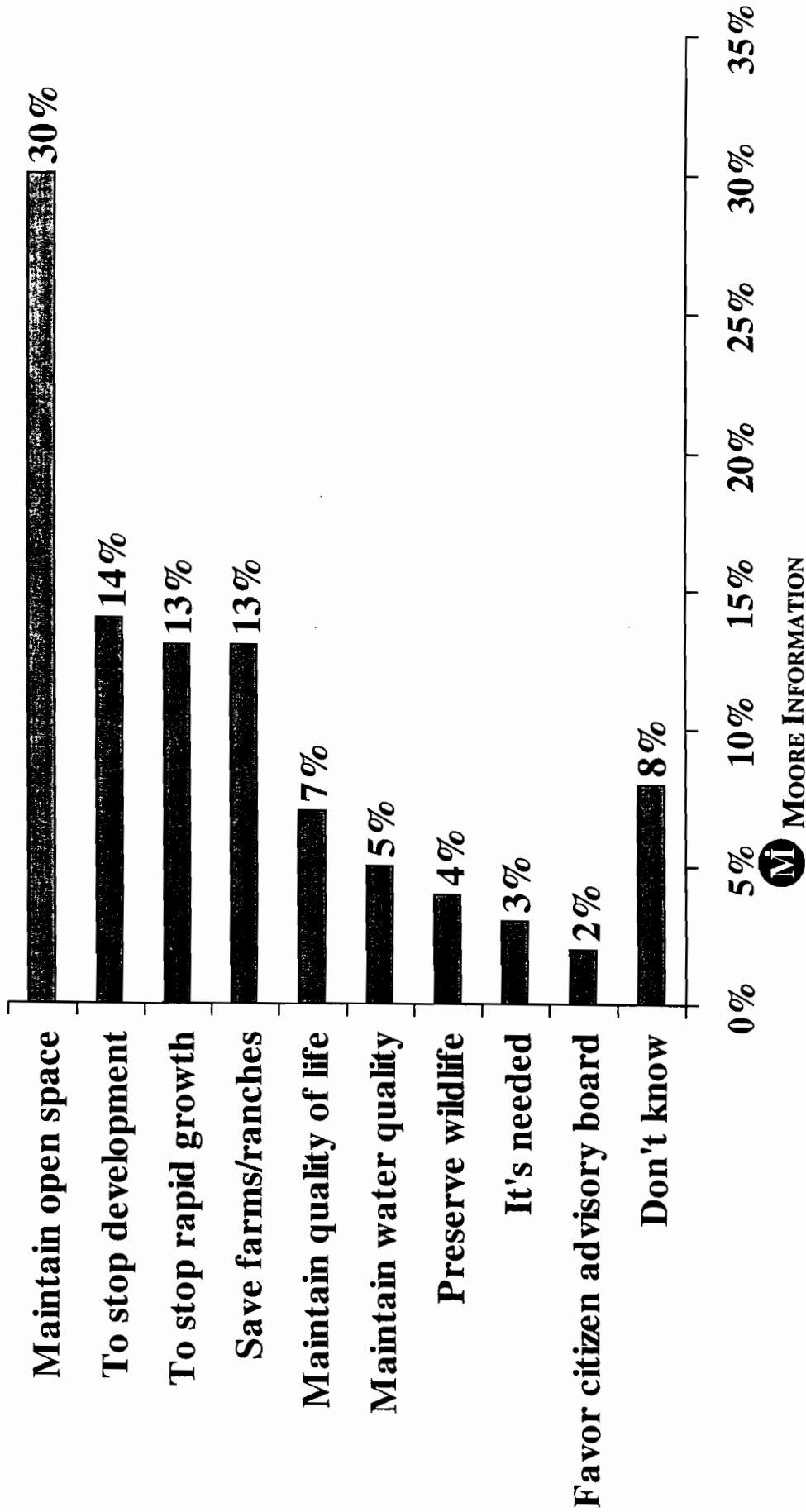

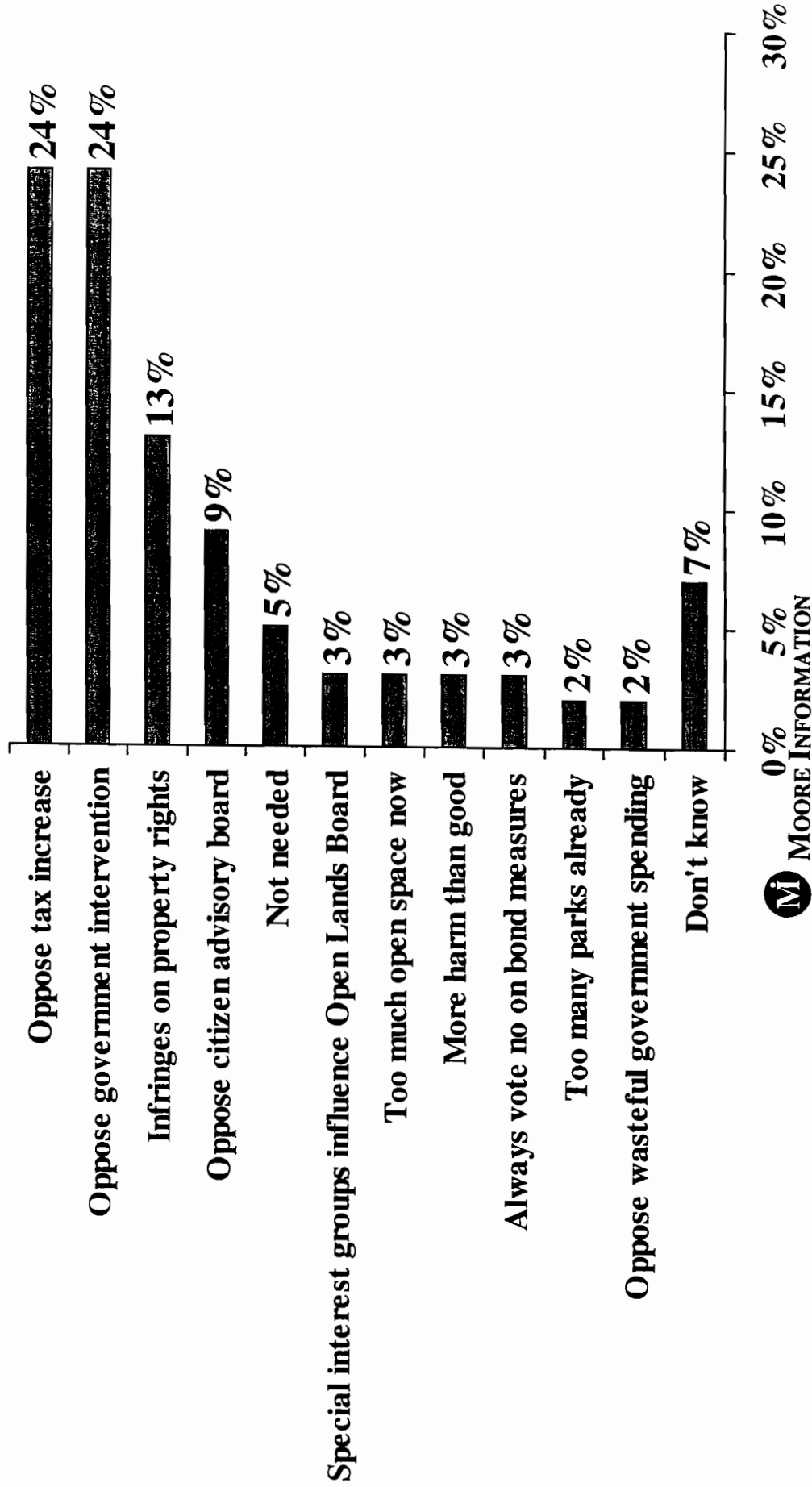

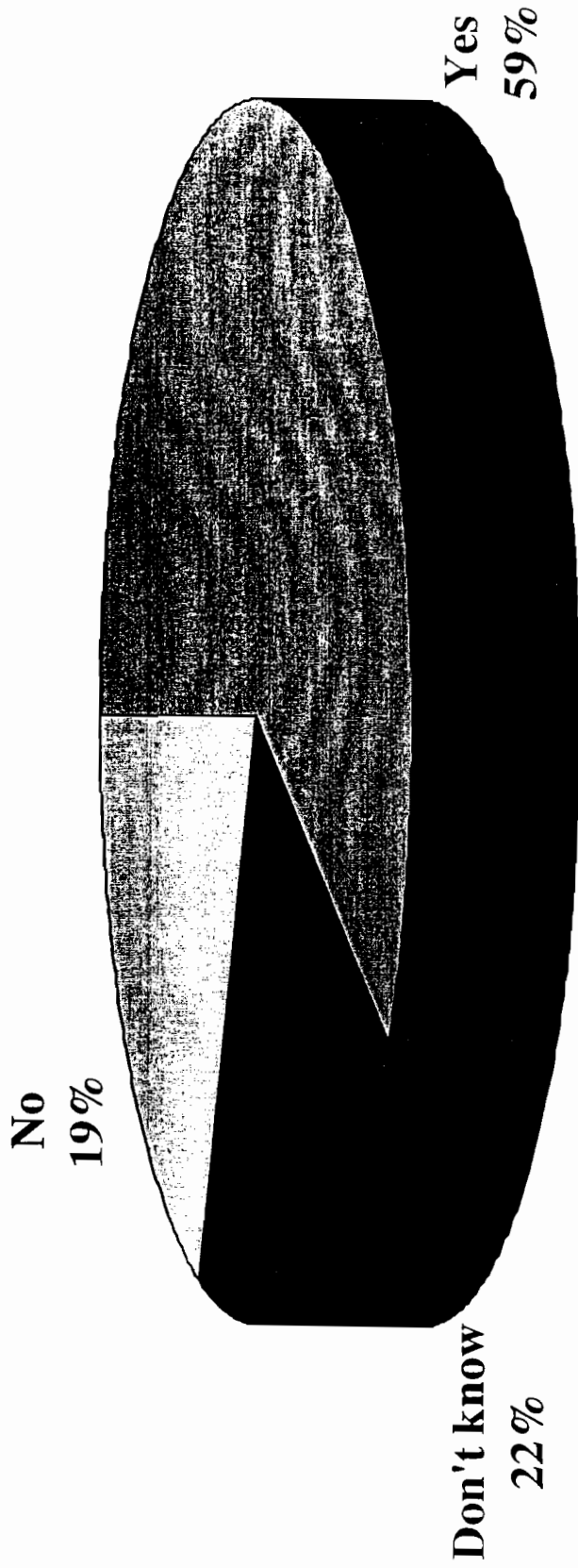

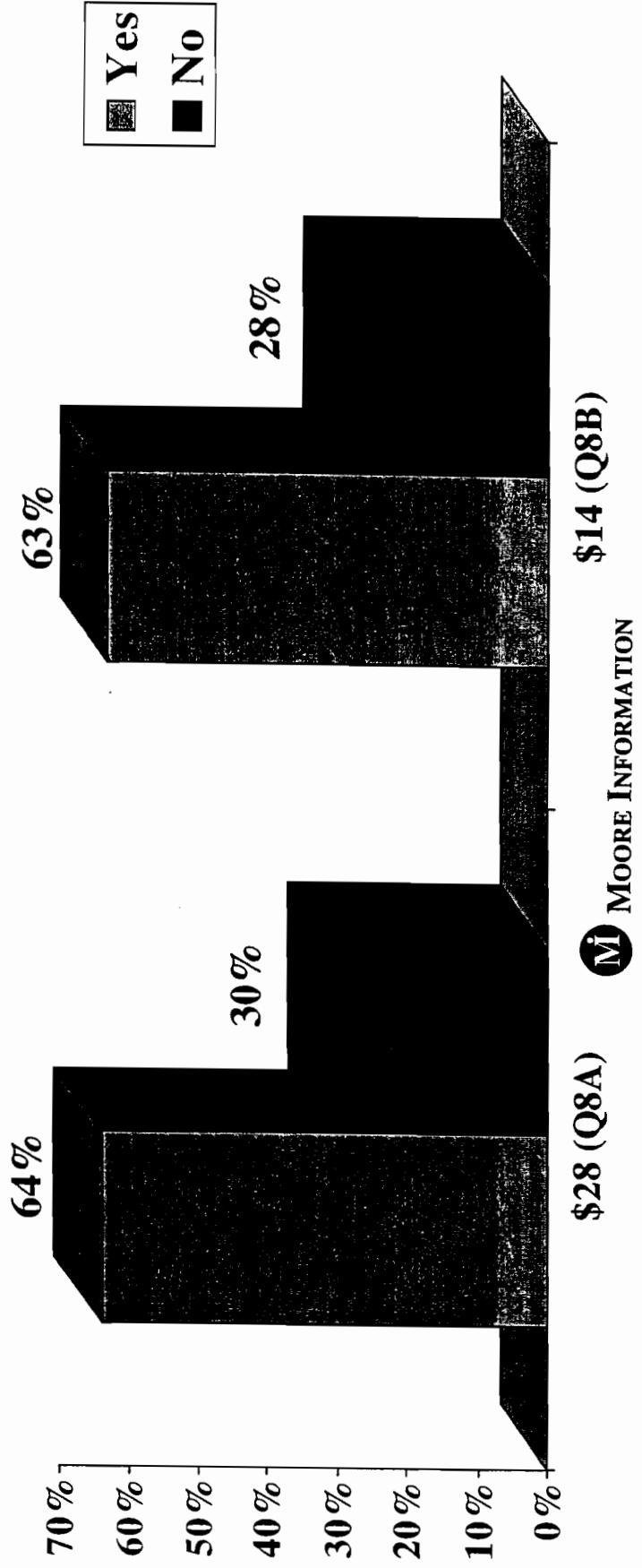

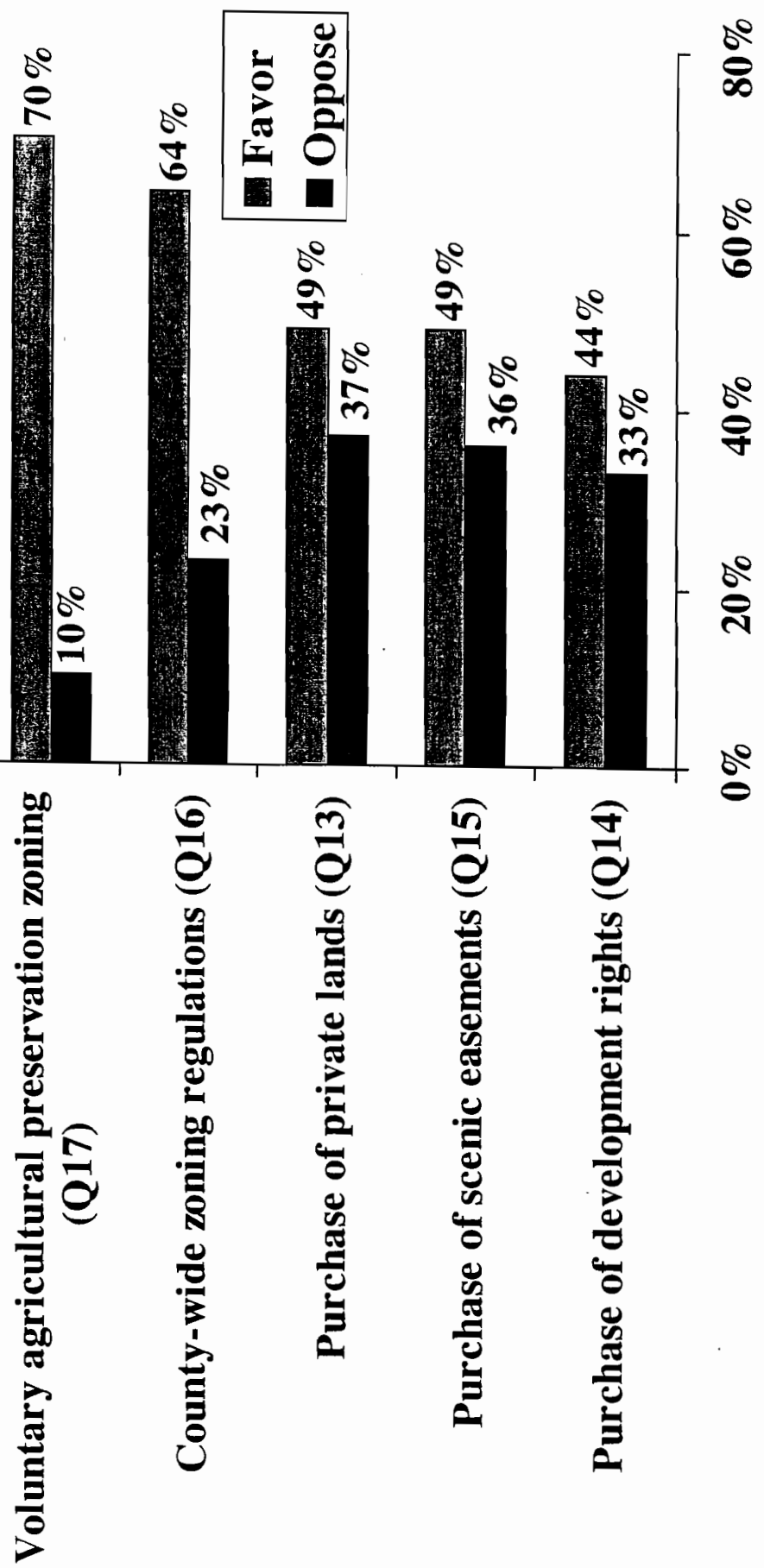

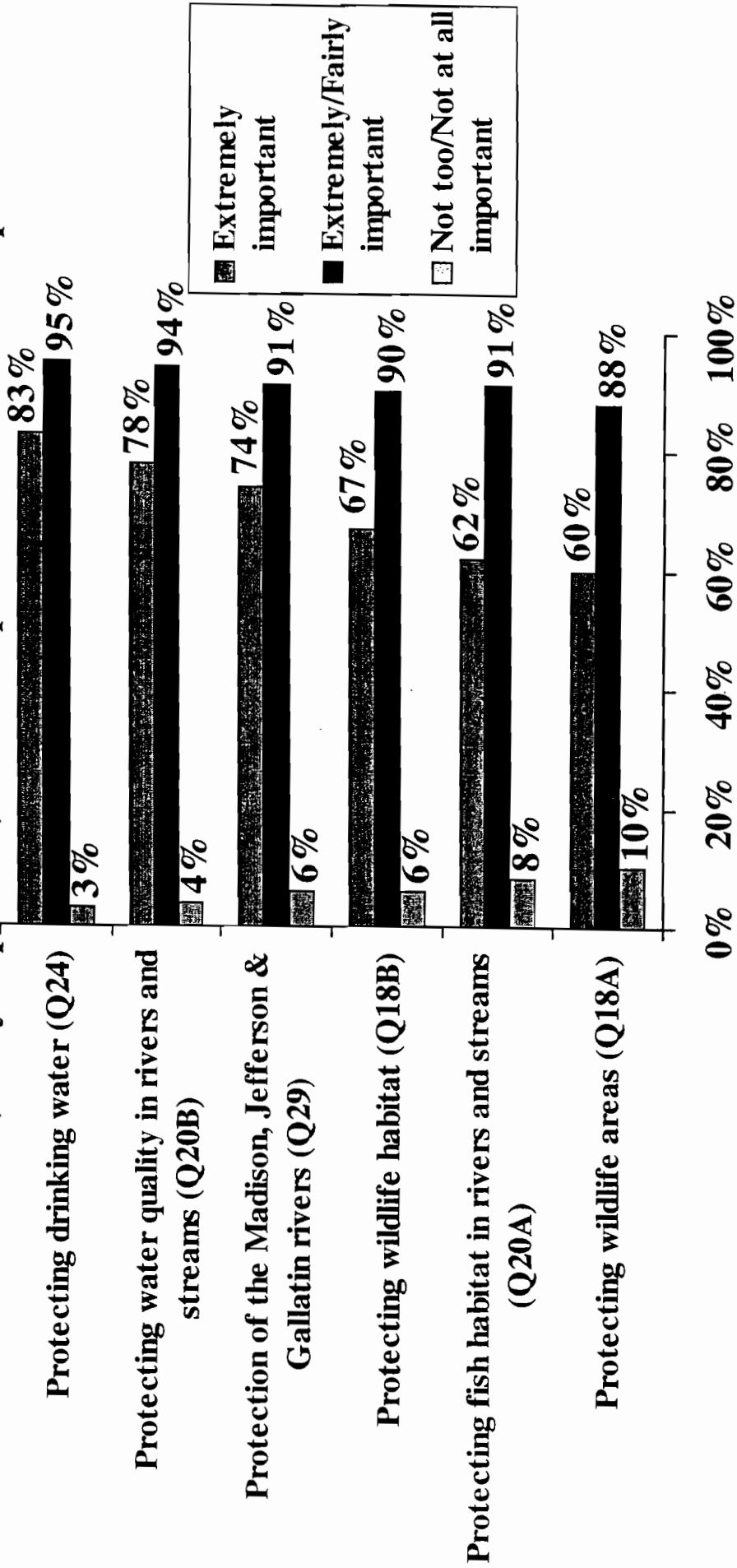

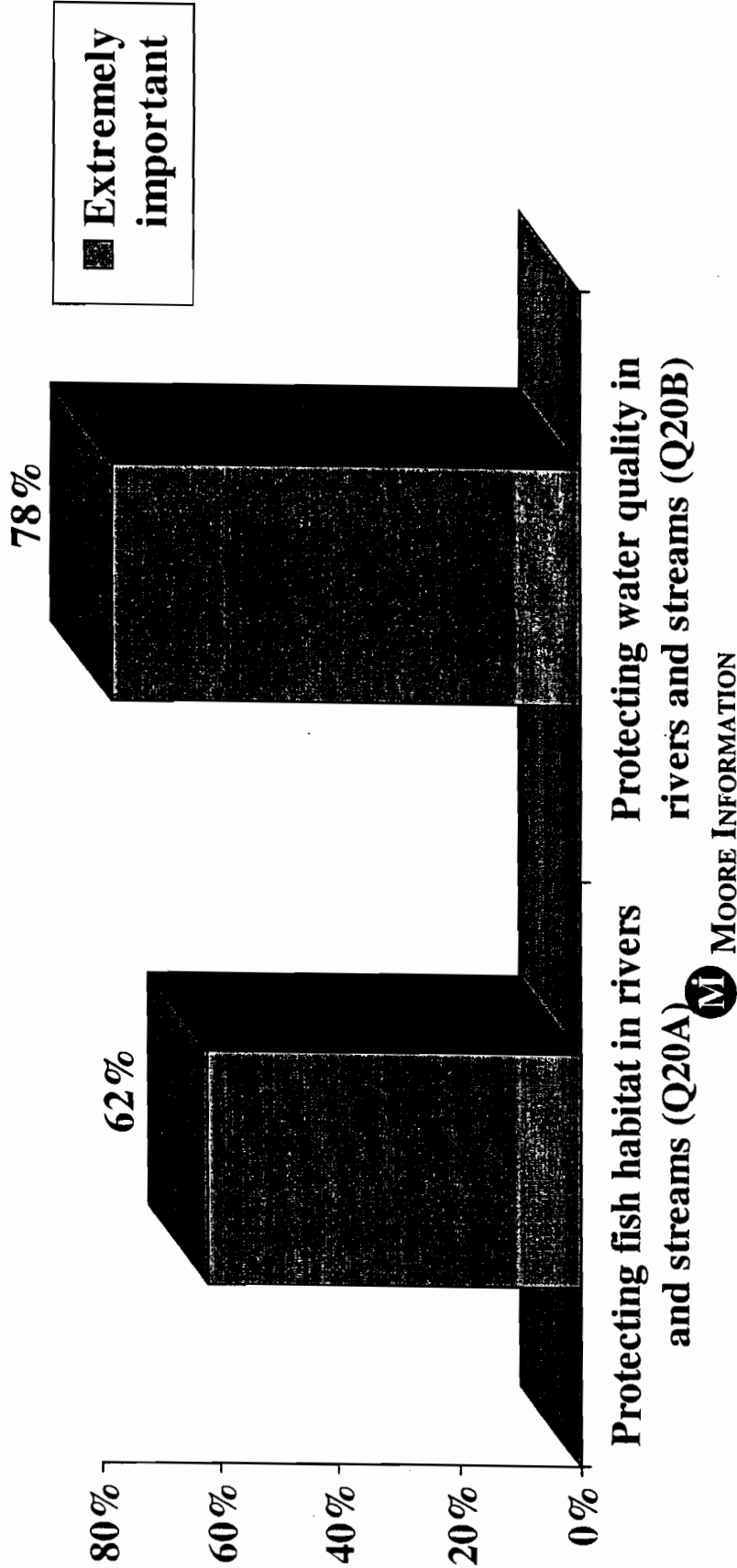

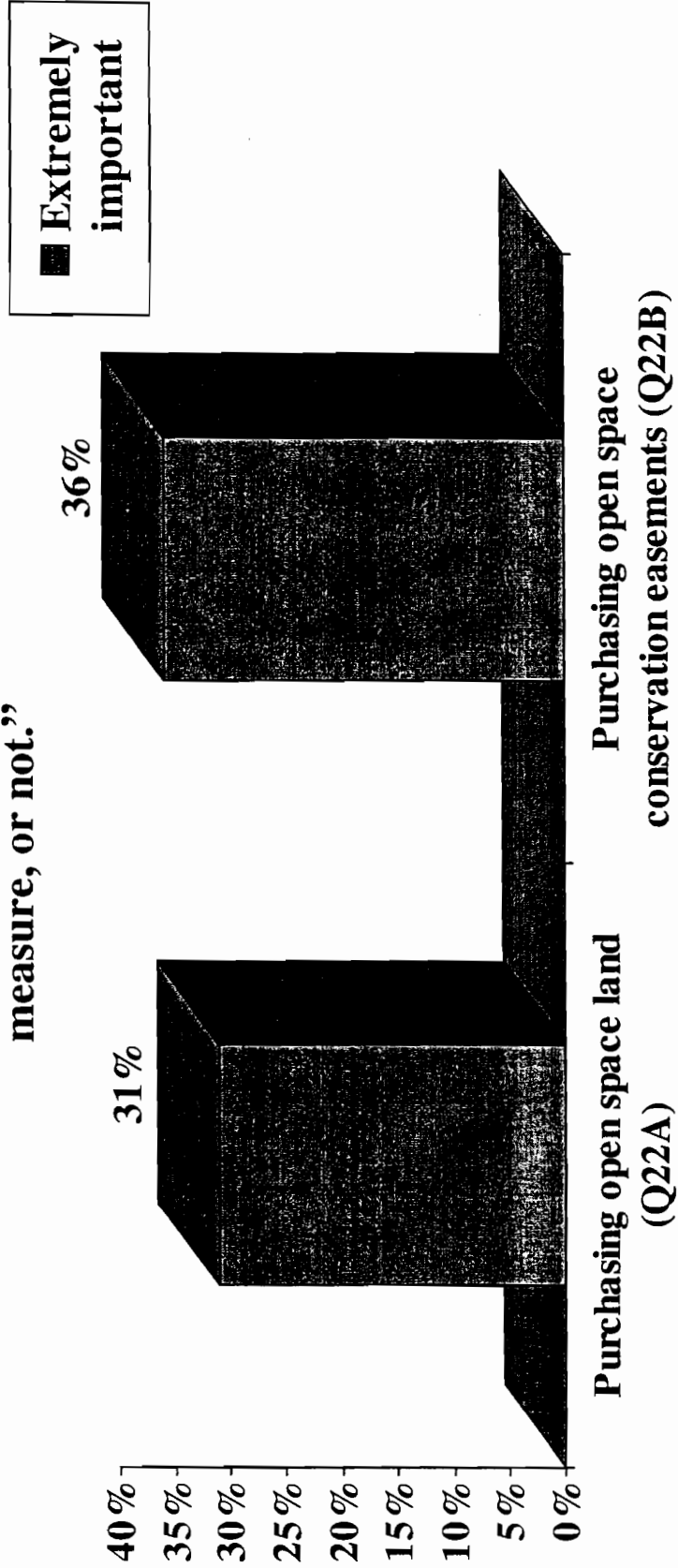

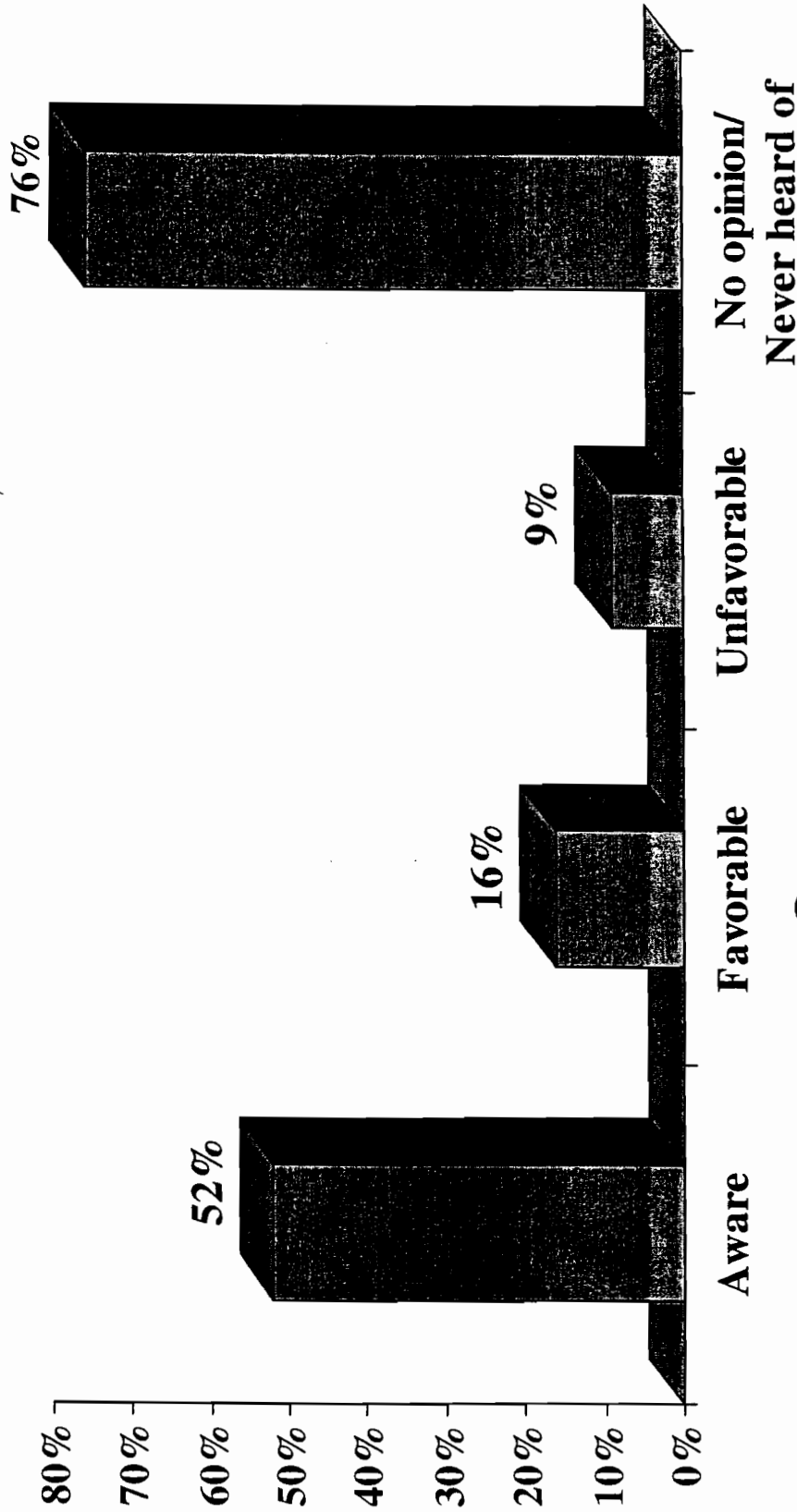

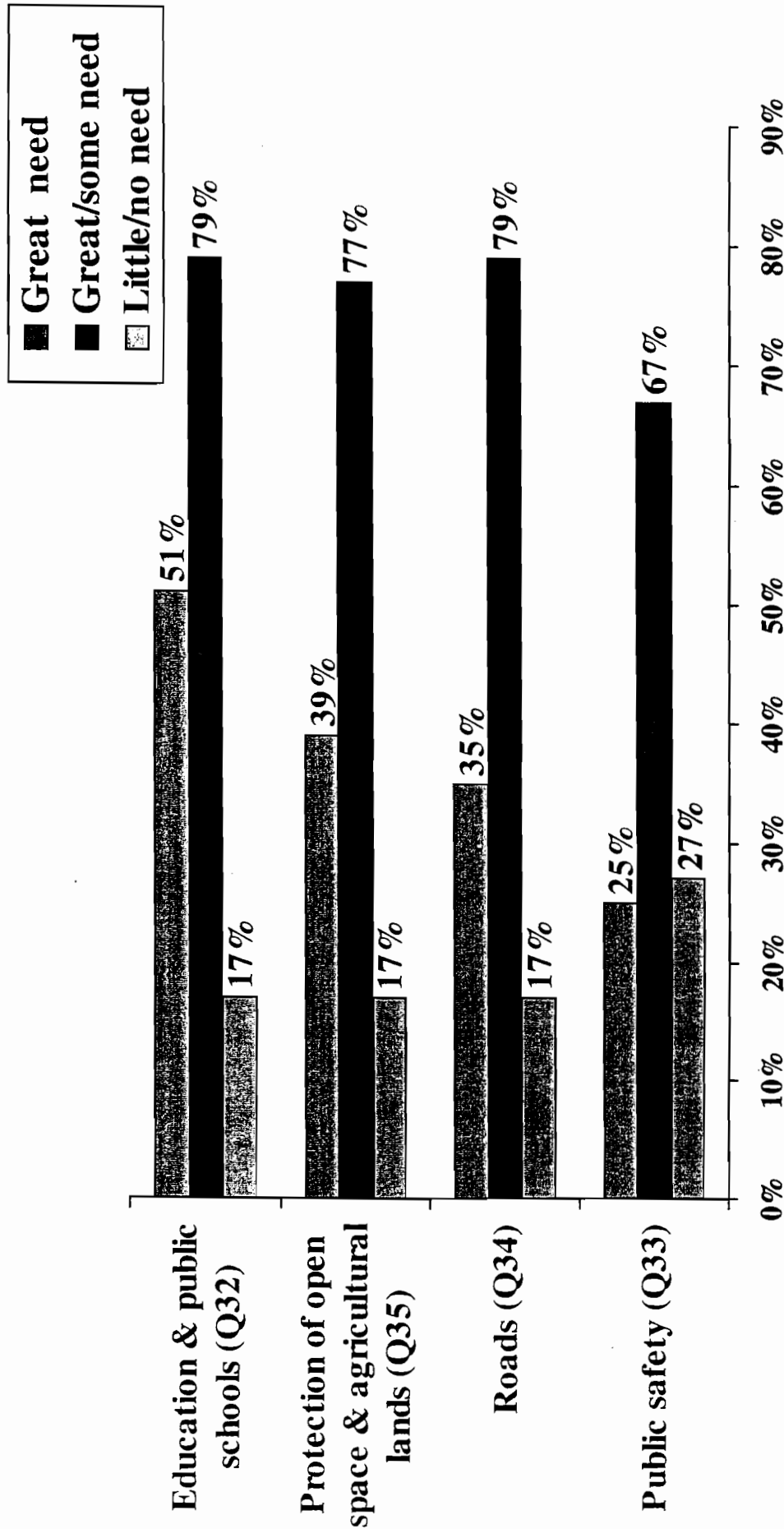
